

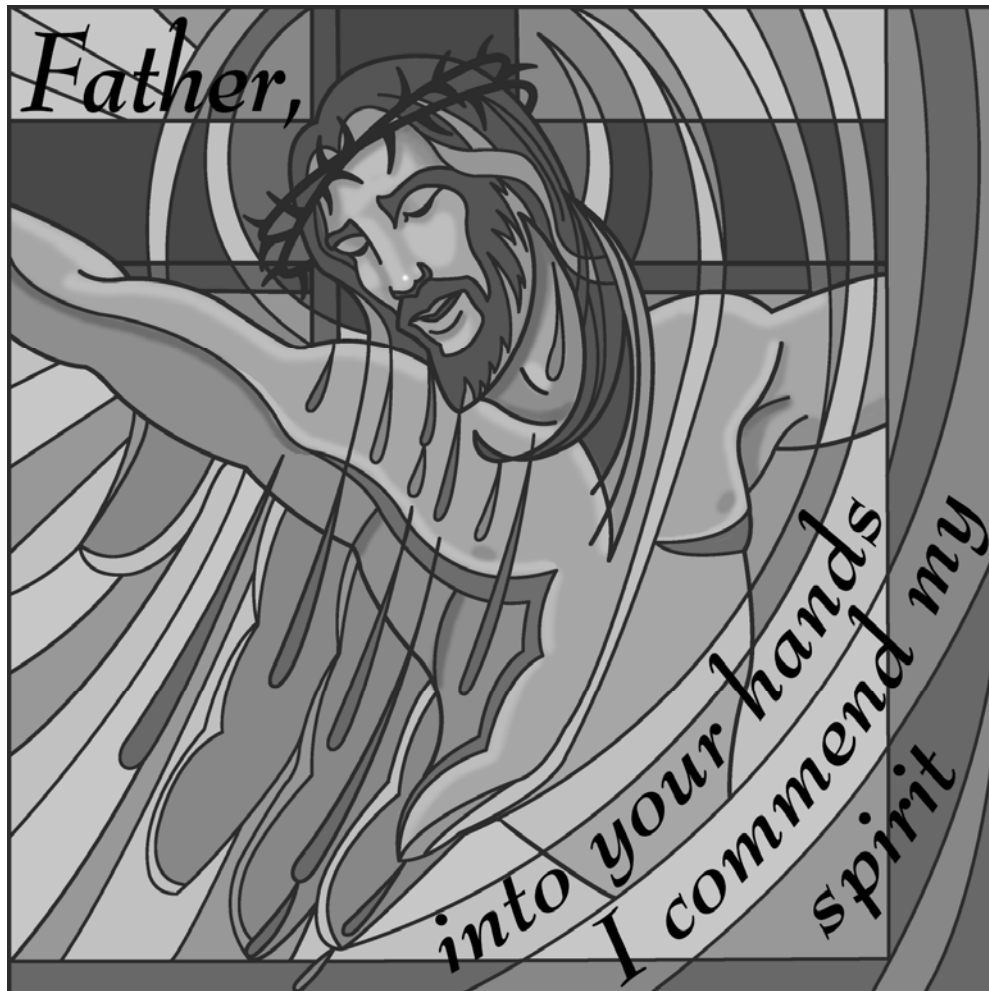

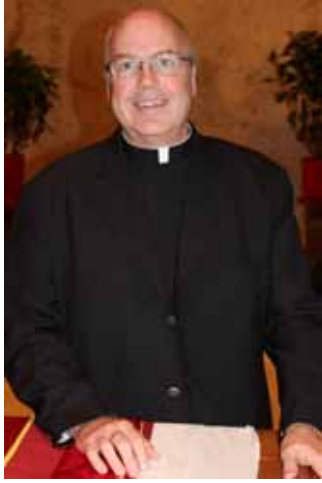

From the Pastor's Desk...

Habemus Papam! A week ago Wednesday those words announced to the world that we have a pope! The crowds in St. Peter's Square and the rest of us waited anxiously around our televisions, radio, or social media to find out who it was. When the announcement came and our new Holy Father, Francis I, walked onto the loggia I was thrilled to once again see that the Holy Spirit confounded the odds makers and new media! Cardinal Jorge Mario Bergoglio

from Argentina was not on their radar screens as a probable candidate! Praise the God who loves to surprise! Let us keep Pope Francis I in our prayers!

As we learn more about Pope Francis, we are certainly struck by his simple life-style, his concern for the poor, and his compassion. As we enter this Holy Week with Pope Francis, how fortunate we are to hear Luke's account of the Passion today. The gospel of Luke has been called the gospel of prayer, the gospel of women and the gospel of compassion because it stops to pay attention to these themes and the stories about them. Certainly our new Holy Father is a man of prayer and compassion! Luke's account of the passion of Jesus shows Jesus praying with great intensity in the garden. He prays from the cross, asking his Father to forgive those who are killing him. He reserves his final breath to pray "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

On his way to Golgotha, Jesus stops to acknowledge the grief of the women of Jerusalem. Even in his death throes, Jesus is alert to the needs of others. He will die in the place of Barabbas. He hears the appeal of the thief crucified with him and promises him paradise. His Passion to the end is for the sake of sinners. We are indebted to Luke for small details that reveal the deeper connections and implications of Jesus' death. He is betrayed by a friend, one of his own disciples. He is denied by Peter, chosen to lead the others to faith. His final hours reveal the complicity and corruption of power in both Pilate and Herod.

Scene by scene, sentence by sentence, Luke's Passion is heart-breaking, and it is meant to move us to compassion. We are invited to stand with the women who weep as Jesus staggers past. We are invited to identify with Simon of Cyrene, drafted to take up Jesus' cross in order to insure that he survives long enough to be nailed to it. The reading of the Passion is meant to be felt as much as listened to. Only the heart can grasp the full weight of the tragedy unfolding in the events of Jesus' death. We are invited to join our own personal suffering and losses to Jesus' way of the cross. And we, as baptized members of his body in the world, are meant to invoke all of the terrible suffering the world has experienced in the past year. Only here, in this hour, will any of it make any sense. This is our work, united with our new Holy Father, Pope Francis I, for Holy Week. It will prepare us to feel Easter!

I invite you to enter fully into the saving mystery of our redemption by joining us at St. Thomas for the celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday afternoon and the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday evening, all leading to the glorious celebration of the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday.

Faith and Formation Commission— *Adult*



Luke 22:14-23:56

The passion of Christ is the story of the incarnate Jesus showing us how to live, how to die, and how to love. He was betrayed and abandoned by those closest to him. Yet, even when he was dying on the cross, he showed mercy to others. This Holy Week may we ever more closely model our lives on Jesus Christ.

C.A.R.E. CORNER

Jesus saw Himself in relationship with God, as a child and an heir with God as the Father. He was the beloved of God from whom nothing could separate Him, which was confirmed when He heard the voice from the heavens declare “You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased (see Mark 1:11). Even as a child, Jesus seemed to have an astounding understanding of His relationship to His Heavenly Father, confirmed by His need and desire to be in His “Father’s house” (Luke 2:49). Jesus connected His life and His purpose to that relationship.

Perhaps it is John’s gospel that makes this the clearest in Jesus’ adulthood. Chapter 17 captures Jesus in prayer to His Father in heaven. Jesus said that eternal life is knowing “you, the only true God and the one whom you sent. . .” (John 17:3). Jesus recognized that His reason for living and the purpose of His human experience was to be in intimate communion with God. The path God chose for Jesus brought Jesus to Him. Jesus followed that path. God invites us to be His children as well. And God chooses a path for each of us. Will we follow our path to the end that God intended?

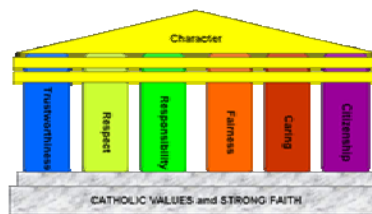

This Palm Sunday marks the beginning of the most important week in our Catholic tradition. We hear in the Processional Gospel about Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem and how the people gave him a kingly welcome laying their cloaks on the road to pay him homage. Next we hear from Isaiah in one of the "suffering servant" passages which foreshadows Jesus' mission on Earth, including his suffering and death. Paul in his letter to the Philippians exalts Christ's humbling himself to human form, taking on the burden of our sins and, "becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." And finally, we hear Luke's entire account of the Passion narrative beginning with the Last Supper and concluding Jesus being laid in the tomb.

From a Scripture standpoint, we're left with a lot to think about, but I think a key point to take away from it all (which is intertwined in all the readings) is to be aware of the human expectation of "greatness" versus God's understanding of what *true* greatness means, and what it looks like. Jesus' humility and obedience to what God had asked of him is our perfect model for what greatness is all about, humbling himself in the role of a servant, and paying the ultimate price for our sins. All the while, amidst all his suffering and persecution, Christ continues to show supreme and unconditional love, even to the point of forgiving his executioners! Talk about a radical concept of what it means to love others, even your strongest enemies.

This love is a great focus for this Holy Week. How has God demonstrated unconditional love for you in your life? How have you reflected that love of God to others? Do you honor that free and unconditional love of God, in how you view yourself and act when you're alone? We have the luxury of knowing how this story ends, so let us make the power of this love our hope this week as we celebrate these solemn and holy days. May God blesses you and your families during this special time and may each of us, by remembering Christ's passion, awaken ourselves to our own calling to *true greatness*.

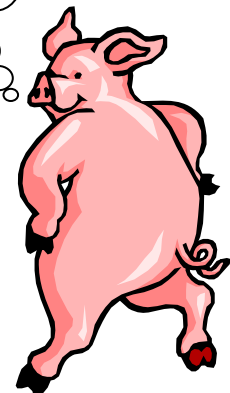
Care Pantry Easter Ham Collection This Weekend

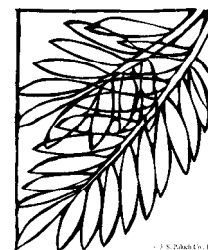
