From the Pastor's Desk...

There are many mysteries in life. When I am confounded by some mystery, I always remind myself that life is not a problem to be solved, but a mystery to be lived! One of those mysteries is what we celebrate liturgically today – The Most Holy Trinity; One God, Three persons. How in the world can you explain it? St. Patrick tried by using the three-leaf clover – one clover with three leaves. Others have used the three states of water: liquid, vapor and ice. All are water acting in

three distinct ways.

Instead of solving the mystery of the Trinity, I prefer to think about what the Trinity *means*. When we read the Bible, we discover that it is all about *relationships*. From the first page to the last, the Bible is all about relationships – our relationship with God and our relationship with one another. The relationship between the Father, Son, and Spirit are all equal. Each person is fully divine and equal to the others. There is no hierarchy implied in the work ascribed to each person of the Trinity. This is the model for our human relationships. We should abandon our pursuit for domination over one another. Each member of the human family is distinct, each given distinct qualities and mission. Therefore there should be no separation of the human family into higher and lower levels. In the doctrine of the Trinity we find the ultimate basis for the pursuit of justice. The doctrine of the Trinity is the basis of a new world order. Imagine that! A mystery to be lived, not a problem to be solved!

This Monday we celebrate Memorial Day in our nation. Unfortunately for many it is just a day off and the “official” beginning of summer fun, recreation, and relaxation. But more than that, it is a day to pause and reflect upon the sacrifices that have been made by men and women serving in the military so that we can continue to enjoy the freedoms we so treasure, but often take for granted. It is a day to remember those who have been killed in battle, and those veterans who have died.

I encourage you to visit a cemetery today – any cemetery. Most likely you will see an American flag placed at the grave of a veteran or one who made the ultimate sacrifice in battle. Stop and say a prayer of thanks – even if you don't know the person. I also invite you to join us in prayer at 9:00 a.m. Mass on Memorial Day and pray for our deceased veterans and all who have served or are currently serving in the military. Let us also pray for peace and an end of war so that the words of Isaiah the prophet might be a reality in our day:

“They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks. One nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again.

(Isaiah 2:4)

C.A.R.E. CORNER

With the loss of Judas as one of the original 12 disciples, the remaining eleven wasted no time going about the business of choosing a successor to take his place. According to Acts 1:15-16, it was Peter who initiated the process. They selected two qualified men and then let the Holy Spirit guide the final decision. Matthias was chosen and was added to the ranks of the Twelve. If the disciples thought it was of utmost importance to name a successor for Judas, wouldn't it be equally important to ultimately have successors for all of the disciples, especially those who remained faithful to Christ?

Additionally, as the numbers of believers continued to grow, more helpers were needed to attend to the day to day needs of the worshipping community. This is where we get introduced to those who served as Deacons, from the Greek "diakonos" meaning servant or minister. The Twelve called together the community of disciples and asked them to choose seven reputable men. The apostles then laid hands on them and sent them off to serve the community. This freed up the apostles to focus on their primary mission, which was to spread the word of God. (Acts 6:1-7)



Living My Faith This Summer

Pre Kindergarten

Make and send a card to someone who's feeling sad, lonely or sick.

Draw pictures of Jesus and his friends— include yourself.

Have a nature observation day—notice the goodness of God's creation.

Tell your parents a Bible story in which you are one of Jesus' Disciples.

Make pictures of things for which you are thankful.

At dinner, say a prayer of thanks for food and family. Take turns thanking God for what He gives to us.

Make a list of all the wonderful things God knows about you.

Plant a seed and watch it grow, realizing how amazing all of life is.

Thank your parent(s) for caring for you.

Tell someone you love them and that Jesus loves them too!

Make your bed (or some other chore) without being asked to do so.

Say a prayer for a friend.

Think of Saints you have heard about. How can you be more like them?

Know Jesus loves you just as you are.

Kindergarten

Play "Jesus Says:" like Simon Says (ie. Make the Sign of the Cross).

Make a scrapbook of your Baptism.

Dress up and act out Bible Stories.

Throw a party for Jesus.

Create a booklet or quilt of creation.

Make encouraging signs ("Jesus Loves You") for your home.

Have a refrigerator prayer list.

(Write your Prayers of the Faithful.)

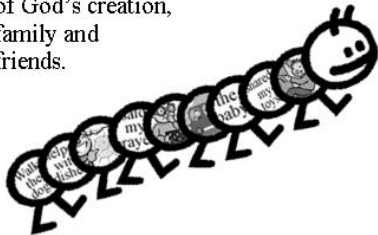
Make a "Caring Caterpillar" out of small paper plates or circles of paper, to show how you care for others.

See how long it can get throughout the summer.

Say prayers together as a family. Attend church together on Sunday.

Make chalk drawings of God's creation,

family and friends.



First Grade

Make the Sign of the Cross and pray together the Lord's Prayer, "Our Father".

Pray together with your family for the people in your life.

Read stories about Jesus.

Attend Mass together. Point out during the mass that the priest is doing the same thing Jesus did at the Last Supper. Make the connection between the stories you hear at Mass and stories from the Bible.

Attend a Mass when there are Baptisms. After Mass, bless yourselves from the holy water in the Baptismal Font. At home, show pictures of your Baptism. Light your Baptism candle and say a prayer together.

Walk around church. Look at the Altar Table, the Risen Cross, the Baptismal Font. Kneel at the Blessed Mary Statue and say a prayer.

Visit the Sanctuary Lamp and the Tabernacle in the Chapel and say hello to Jesus by making the sign of the cross or saying a prayer.



Second Grade

Pray a decade of the Rosary or more – with your family. Pray the Hail Mary. Attend Sunday Mass and continue to celebrate your second, third, fourth, fifth communion and know that Jesus is present in the Eucharist.

Remember—the bread and wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Jesus so when you receive Communion, try to be like Jesus with family and friends.

Make a chart this summer of all the things you do, that are like Jesus.

Eucharist means "to give thanks" so when you pray at bedtime, think of what you are thankful for each day.



Third Grade

Lead your family in the dinner prayer.

Attend Mass – volunteer to bring up the cross or gifts at mass as a family.

Pray the Apostle's Creed or Nicene Creed.

Walk the labyrinth behind St. Thomas or the one on the Riverwalk.

Walk the Stations of the Cross behind the parking lot at church.

Pray a decade of the Rosary each night or pray the entire Rosary as a family.

Read from the Bible: Matthew, Mark, Luke, John and Acts

Tell your parent how to write chapter and verse from the Bible (John 3:16)

Fourth Grade

Attend Mass and look up the Sunday Readings in your Bible.

Randomly open your Bible and read one of the passages.

Take your Bible to the pool or park with you and do some reading.

Introduce a friend to the Bible.

Examine your conscience (use the handout) and pray the Act of Contrition.

Remember to say "I forgive you" when someone else says, "I am sorry."

Pray the Rosary using the pamphlet received in class.

Say a short prayer asking Jesus to guide you to what you need to hear.

Bless those in your family with the sign of the Cross as you did at Reconciliation.

Review the meaning of the commandments & beatitudes in your booklet.

Perform one action living the beatitudes (be attitudes).

Go to Reconciliation; Read about the life of a saint.

Do an extra chore to buy a food item for the Care Pantry.

Fifth Grade

Pray together the following prayers: The Lord's Prayer, Hail Mary, Glory Be, Act of Contrition, Nicene Creed, Apostle's Creed, The Rosary.

Pray the different prayer forms (blessing, thanksgiving, praise and intercession).

Share/discuss major events in Jesus' life.

Recall seasons of our liturgical calendar and Holy Days. August 15 we will celebrate Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Attend Sunday Masses. After mass discuss what the Readings/Gospel means for you.

As a family, discuss the Question of the Week. Post your thoughts on our blog <http://staquestionofweek.blogspot.com>. Review our 7 sacraments, their symbols and signs.

Recall and share pictures of any sacraments your family has received.

Outreach and Social Justice Ministries with Special Volunteer Needs

It is that time of year for ministry signup. In Outreach and Social Justice, there are a number of areas where volunteers are especially needed. Please consider one of the following ministries when you complete your ministry signup this year.

DuPage PADS (*Number 623 in the Ministry Booklet*)

A Facilitator (or Co-Facilitators) is needed for this ministry. The first Sunday of the months October through May, St. Thomas volunteers staff the PADS shelter for the homeless at Community United Methodist Church near downtown Naperville. Dinner is provided and served to anywhere from 40 – 60 people, including some families with children. Volunteers in shifts monitor the guests overnight, prepare a bag lunch, prepare breakfast in the morning, and then do clean-up. The process is well-defined and there are many veteran volunteers that know what needs to be done. The primary role of the facilitator(s) is to determine the dinner meal and schedule the volunteers. Normally the facilitator is there during the dinner shift, but that is not necessary every month. The OSJ Office wants to thank Sean & Fatima Moriarty for acting as facilitators over the past two years. They did a great job. They have put together a detailed “Facilitator’s Manual” that includes dinner plans. Please discern if this might be a role for you. Hesed House PADS (*Ministry Booklet #622*) & DuPage PADS (*Ministry Booklet #623*)

Both PADS homeless shelter ministries could use additional volunteers for the monitoring shifts and the breakfast shift. Please see the Ministry Booklet for more details.

Saint Vincent de Paul (*SVDP*) (*Ministry Booklet #628*)

The Saint Vincent de Paul Ministry provides emergency rent/mortgage and utility funds for local area families. Vincentians function in a compassionate fashion, traveling in pairs as home visitors to visit the families in their homes. They gather information from the families and say a prayer with the family. They verify information and then the home visitors make the decision as to whether or not help can be provided. Experienced home visitors are paired with new home visitors. It is a very rewarding ministry.

Haiti English Immersion Program Cancelled

All plans were in place to host five Holy Cross seminarians and Father Mario from Ste Marie Madeleine-the St. Thomas twinning parish in Haiti-for six weeks beginning in late June. However, the seminarians were unable to obtain their visas from the US Embassy in time. This had never been a problem before. The process to obtain a visa requires scheduling a Visa Request meeting at the Embassy. Even though the seminarians applied for a meeting two months prior to the trip, they could not get a meeting until well after the beginning of the program. A combination of circumstances including lower staff levels at the embassy and a higher demand for visas contributed to the problem. The tentative plan is to go forward with the program in the summer of 2014.

Thanks to all that helped with this year's planning and had volunteered for this year's program.

The St. Thomas Haiti Twinning Ministry will invite Fr. Mario to visit St. Thomas in late June or early July. He already has a valid visa.

Jobs Breakthrough with College of DuPage

As many of you are aware, DuPage United has been working for some time on the “Jobs Gap” in DuPage County; there are some 30,000 people unemployed in the county. At the same time about one-third of the open manufacturing jobs go unfilled. These are good paying jobs, in clean work environments, with benefits and career advancement opportunities. There are excellent training facilities available. The government provides funds for workforce development.

Last week, Dr. Breuder, President of College of DuPage (COD), agreed to sign on to DuPage United’s effort to bring education, business, and government together to work on solutions for the mid skill job gap in DuPage County. This is the last major piece in putting together this puzzle.

This agreement gives Dr. Breuders' blessing to COD Staff and Faculty working together with DuPage United, DuPage County local government, the K-12 education system, and local businesses on workforce issues. This effort will involve a major mailing to local business leaders requesting they join DuPage United in discussing and crafting solutions to the problem. 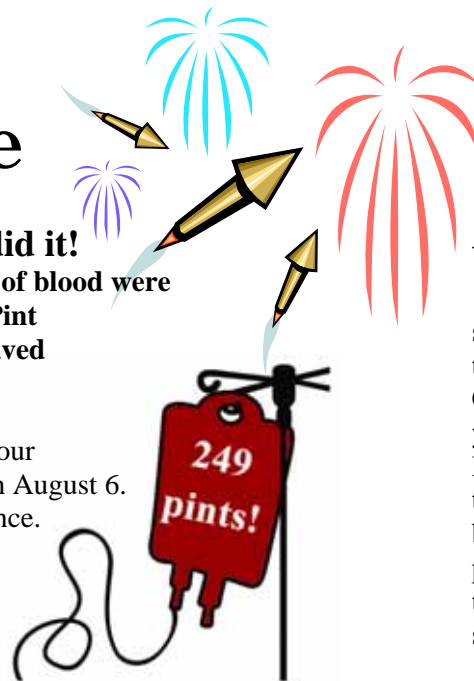
